
Basic Education – a key enabler for sustainable and economic development an important factor in Switzerland's International **Cooperation Strategy**

Basic education enhances our abilities to face global challenges and plays a vital role in preparing people for successful and rewarding lives. Its broad benefits are highest in low- and lowermiddle-income countries, especially for women. Returns to investment in basic education are systematically higher than returns to later-stage education and training.



As a key enabler for sustainable development, basic education is key for the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC). It comprises formal primary and secondary education as well as alternative education tailored to the learning needs of people of all ages.² Basic Education develops foundational basic skills and competencies. It is the foundation for individual, social and economic development, for gender equality, equal participation, health and decent work.

Each additional year of basic education means 10% higher earnings in the future.

... in full scope ensures enhanced career growth and yields enormous wage boosts




Completing a full 12 year-cycle of basic education translates to earning increases of more than 300 percent.

... contributes to better health, longevity and sustainable population growth




Each additional year of female schooling lowers the probability of girls teenage marriage and childbearing by 6%.

... contributes to greater resilience, adaptability and gender equality




Children whose mother has at least primary education are up to 170% more likely to be in school relatively to mothers without primary education.

... reduces poverty




Achieving universal primary and secondary attainment in the adult population would help to lift more than 420 million out of poverty, thus reducing the number of poor worldwide by more than half.
